Please do not include any dives that do not meet AAUS standards, i.e. recreational dives accepted by the DCB as proficiency dives. Project Dragonfly

Two AAUS student members took part in international graduate studies this past summer through Miami University's Project Dragonfly, which offers graduate courses in 15 countries throughout Africa, Australia, Asia and the Americas.

Tiffany Gray of Merritt Island, Fla., studied the desert ecosystems of inland Baja and then traveled to the coast to explore the marine biosphere reserve at Bahía de los Ángeles, a UNESCO World Heritage site in the Sea of Cortez.

Michelle Ruthenberg of Myrtle Beach, S.C., studied community-based efforts to preserve Bornean species along the Kinabatangan River in Sabah (East Malaysia) on the island of Borneo.

These students participated in Miami University's Earth Expeditions, a global program offering graduate courses to people from all disciplines. The program combines webbased learning with field experiences in 15 countries throughout the world. Inspired by the experience in these countries, each student is now conducting an individual semester-long research project.

Since the program began 10 years ago, Project Dragonfly has engaged more than 1,700 people in firsthand educational and scientific research at critical conservation field sites in Africa, Australia, Asia and the Americas. New in 2016 are courses in Paraguay and Galapagos. Dragonfly is located in the department of biology at Miami University, a state university in Oxford, Ohio. Miami was established in 1809 and is listed as one of the eight original Public Ivies.
